"I felt a quiet sense of privilege to be part of SICOGA 2025. The grandeur of the inauguration was not in the ceremony alone but in the diversity of people gathered, each carrying stories, struggles and hopes of their own. I met people from various countries — some familiar faces I already knew, and others I was meeting for the very first time. What made the experience even more overwhelming and pleasant was finally meeting, in person, those with whom I had only spoken over the phone or on conference calls. The words spoken during inauguration resonated deeply, reminding us that peace is not an abstract dream but a collective responsibility that begins with dialogue, openness and compassion. Sitting among so many voices united by a single purpose, I felt both humbled and inspired. The symbolic team event at night after dinner was perhaps the most powerful expression of the day.

As strands of wool passed from hand to hand, a vibrant net slowly took shape, woven together by our shared presence. When some participants dared to jump onto that fragile-looking net, it held firm — not because of one thread, but because of the strength of many. It was a moving metaphor for peace itself: fragile when left to a few, but unbreakable when woven together by many hands, many hearts. In that moment, I felt a surge of hope — that despite differences of language, culture or nation, we can create a fabric strong enough to hold us all." - Bhudeb Chakravarti
